of Lancaster is in charge. Mrs. Hanf was born in Stuttgart, Germany, August 17, 1865. Her parents died during her early child-hood, and she came to the United • 3 States at the age of eighteen. She lived first near Nebraska City, Nebraska, where she was married within a year or so to John G. Ritter. She and Mr. Ritter farmed there for seven years, or until 1892, when they came to Anteless Velley. 3 when they came to Antelope Valley in California to settle here as one of the first of the pioneer families. Three of their nine children were 3 born in Nebraska, the rest at the homestead in Leona Valley. The Ritter Ranch was developed as a fruit and grape growing center, also a grain and cattle ranch. It is in-teresting that all but one of the Ritter boys have remained in the Valley, continuing in ranching ens terprises.

Mr. Ritter died in 1915, and his widow was married in 1925 to Philip Hanf, continuing her residence here until about two years ago when the Ritter Ranch was sold, and she and Mr. Hanf moved to a home at Cajon Pass. For the past six months, Mrs. Hanf returned to the Valley, living with her children and their families.

She is survived by her husband, Philip Hanf; by nine children as follows: Charles, Adolph of Burbank, Willie, Albert, Emil, Johnnie, Mrs. Mary T. Dyer of Bakersfield, Mrs. Frank J. Ikeler, and Mrs. "Buddy" Redman of Lancaster; nineteen grandchildren and three great grandchildren.
